COUNCIL MEETINGS AND HOLIDAY OFFICE CLOSURE

Please be advised that the Township of Howick Municipal Office will be closed from **12:00 p.m. on Wednesday, December 24, 2025, until Friday, January 2, 2026, when it will reopen at 8:30 a.m.** There is a mail slot located to the right of the front entrance for your convenience if you need it outside of our regular business hours.

The first Council meeting for 2026 is scheduled for Tuesday, January 13, 2026, at 9:00 a.m. in the Council Chambers at the Howick Township office. Draft #2 of the 2026 Municipal Budget will be presented at a public council meeting on Tuesday, January 27, 2026, at 7:00 p.m. at the Township Office. Members of the Public are welcome to attend.

The 2026 Schedule of Regular Council meetings can now be found on our website www.howick.ca under Township Services -> Council. Printed copies are also available at the Township Office.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT - SHOVELLING SNOW

Under the Ontario Highway Traffic Act (HTC) Section 181, it is illegal to shovel, blow or plow snow from private property onto a public road or sidewalk. This includes moving snow across roads and depositing it into the ditches/sides of the roadway. It is very dangerous and can cause oncoming vehicles to lose control. Please use caution and always be aware of your surroundings.

As the plows move along, the blades push snow forward, and unfortunately, driveways can get impacted as the snow has to go somewhere. When clearing snow on your driveways be sure to clear a collection pocket on the left side at the end of your driveway which allows an area for the snow pushed by the plow to go. Pile your snow to the right of your driveways so it's downstream of the plow. This prevents you from having to do the same job twice.



CHANGES TO RECYCLING CURBSIDE COLLECTION SERVICES

EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2026

Like all municipalities across Ontario, the Township of Howick has transitioned to the province's new producer-led recycling system effective January 1, 2026. Responsibility for residential recycling collection, disposal and customer service has shifted to the producers of recyclable materials, meaning that the producers of packaging and paper products will fully fund and operate the program. For Howick, the service will be managed by the producer's subcontractor, Waste Management Canada, based in Mount Forest.

What does this mean for Howick Township?

This province-wide change is designed to make recycling simpler and more consistent – and it means residences will be able to recycle more materials than ever before!

Only Eligible Sources – all residential properties, including single family homes and multi-unit buildings – will have their recyclables picked up curbside beginning January 1, 2026.

Non-eligible sources, such as businesses, institutions, commercial and industrial (IC&I) properties, will need to arrange their own recycling collection and disposal services. Please know that this decision was mandated through legislation passed by the Province of Ontario, not the Township of Howick. We do apologize for the short notice. It has been difficult for staff to receive the accurate and clear information regarding the new program so that we can inform our residents and businesses.

To help reduce waste, to discourage dumping and to encourage recycling practices, Howick Township has decided to maintain the operation of the Recycling Depot at the Howick Landfill for our IC&I properties. This ensures Howick businesses, industrial, commercial and institutional properties will have a local place to dispose of their recyclables.

Alternatively, these non-eligible properties can make their own arrangements for recycling collection and disposal (i.e. a commercial dumpster with scheduled disposal or delivering their recyclables to an appropriate recycling facility).

Unfortunately, since the Howick Landfill's Recycling Depot is not eligible under the producer-led residential recycling program, new **Recycling Tipping Fees** have been established to offset the cost of offering this service:

New Recycling Tipping Fees Effective January 1, 2026

Acceptable recyclable materials taken directly to the Howick Landfill:

\$2.00 per blue box or bag

Acceptable cardboard taken directly to the Howick Landfill:

\$2.00 per blue box, armful load or bundle

These user fees have been established on a cost-recovery basis so that residential properties within Howick Township

are not financially responsible for the costs associated with operating a Recycling Depot for our business, industrial, commercial and institutional properties. Residential recycling will continue to be picked up curbside biweekly following the current schedule.

Residential addresses within Howick are encouraged to utilize the residential curbside recycling program, as any recyclable material taken directly to the Howick Landfill after January 1, 2026, will have the Recycling Tipping Fees apply.

What about curbside waste (garbage) collection?

Bi-weekly curbside waste collection in Howick will remain unchanged for now. Howick residents, businesses, industrial, commercial, or institutional properties will continue to set out their garbage in a clear garbage bag, with one, \$3.00 bag tag visible on each bag, based on the current bi-weekly schedule.

Note: For any businesses that operate out of an eligible residence, these properties will still receive bi-weekly residential curbside collection.

WASTE & RECYCLING CARTS ARE COMING TO HOWICK IN 2026!

Howick Township will be transitioning to an automated waste and recycling curbside collection system, with the use of carts, beginning in 2026. Waste Management Canada is awaiting the arrival of new, automated, dual-collection trucks, currently anticipated to arrive between May and July. Once their new fleet is operational, 64-gallon waste carts will be provided and delivered to all Howick properties (including businesses, industrial, commercial and institutional). 95-gallon recycling carts will be provided and delivered to all eligible residential properties. Businesses, industrial, commercial and institutional properties will continue to be responsible for their own recycling, with the Recycling Depot at the Howick Landfill available as one option, with applicable Recycling Tipping Fees.

Curbside collection via carts will follow the current biweekly schedule on Mondays. We understand that waste & recycling collection changes are sometimes difficult, but we believe this will be a better collection system with more consistent service for Howick Township.

CANINE CONTROL

2026 dog tag and kennel license invoices will be mailed in January directly to all currently registered dog owners. If you received an invoice and no longer have a dog, or the number of dogs has changed, please contact reception@howick.ca so that we can update our records.

Dog tag prices are as follows: 1st dog-\$30.00, 2nd dog-\$50.00, 3rd dog-\$80.00. Dogs over the age of 12 weeks must be licensed on or before March 31st of each year. Where an owner obtains a dog after March 31st, the dog must be licensed within 10 days. An overdue payment fee of 2x the normal fee will apply if an owner does not license their dog within the time period shown. Owners may also be fined for failing to license their dog.

Kennel Licence are \$200.00 for 4-10 dogs, and \$25 per dog after 10. Kennel operators are required to book an inspection prior to the issuance of a license. It is the responsibility of dog owner(s) to ensure that all dog(s) are licensed and to contact the Township if there are any changes.




Waste Management Canada, on behalf of Circular Materials Ontario, will manage all residential curbside recycling collection, processing, and customer service beginning January 1st.



THE HISTORY OF new years

Ancient New Year's Celebrations

The earliest recorded festivities in honor of a new year's arrival date back some 4,000 years to ancient Babylon. For the Babylonians, the first new moon following the vernal equinox—the day in late March with an equal amount of sunlight and darkness—heralded the start of a new year. They marked the occasion with a massive religious festival called Akitu (derived from the Sumerian word for barley, which was cut in the spring) that involved a different ritual on each of its 11 days.

Did you know?

In order to realign the Roman calendar with the sun, Julius Caesar had to add 90 extra days to the year 46 B.C. when he introduced his new Julian calendar. Throughout antiquity, civilizations around the world developed increasingly sophisticated calendars, typically pinning the first day of the year to an agricultural or astronomical event. In Egypt, for instance, the year began with the annual flooding of the Nile, which coincided with the rising of the star Sirius. The first day of the Lunar New Year, meanwhile, occurred with the second new moon after the winter solstice.

January 1 Becomes New Year's Day

The early Roman calendar consisted of 10 months and 304 days, with each new year beginning at the vernal equinox; according to tradition, it was created by Romulus, the founder of Rome, in the eighth century B.C. A later king, Numa Pompilius, is credited with adding the months of Januarius and Februarius.

Over the centuries, the calendar fell out of sync with the sun, and in 46 B.C. Julius Caesar decided to solve the problem by consulting with the most prominent astronomers and mathematicians of his time. He introduced the Julian calendar, which closely resembles the more modern Gregorian calendar

that most countries around the world use today.

As part of his reform, Caesar instituted January 1 as the first day of the year, partly to honor the month's namesake: Janus, the Roman god of beginnings, whose two faces allowed him to look back into the past and forward into the future. Romans celebrated by offering sacrifices to Janus, exchanging gifts with one another, decorating their homes with laurel branches and attending raucous parties.

New Year's Traditions and Celebrations

Around the World

In many countries, New Year's celebrations begin on the evening of December 31—New Year's Eve—and continue into the early hours of January 1. Revelers often enjoy meals and snacks thought to bestow good luck for the coming year.

In many parts of the world, traditional New Year's dishes feature legumes, which are thought to resemble coins and herald future financial success. Because pigs represent progress and prosperity in some cultures, pork appears on the New Year's Eve table in Cuba, Austria, Hungary, Portugal and other countries. Ring-shaped cakes and pastries, a sign that the year has come full circle, round out the feast in the Netherlands, Mexico, Greece and elsewhere. In Sweden and Norway, meanwhile, rice pudding with an almond hidden inside is served on New Year's Eve.

Other customs that are common worldwide include watching fireworks and singing songs to welcome the new year. The practice of making resolutions for the new year is thought to have first caught on among the ancient Babylonians, who made promises in order to earn the favor of the gods and start the year off on the right foot. (They would reportedly vow to pay off debts and return borrowed farm equipment.)

UPDATE ON LICENCED CHILDCARE FACILITY PROPOSED FOR HOWICK TOWNSHIP

Gorrie, ON – December 5, 2025 – After hearing from several Howick residents over the past two weeks, Howick Township Council and staff want to assure its residents that the Township has not approved the construction of a \$5 million licensed child care facility.

"The \$5 million dollar cost estimate was the only financial information available (based on the current drawings) to present to Council at their November 18, 2025 Council meeting", says CAO/Clerk Caitlin Gillis.

"In order to be eligible to receive available infrastructure funding and to move forward with amending the drawing, staff required Council's approval to move forward with the project. Staff have only just begun determining the size, licencing requirements and features needed in order to bring 49 licensed child care spaces to Howick Township", says Howick Reeve Doug Harding. "Council has instructed Township staff to significantly reduce the size of the proposed child care centre and its overall budget to get to a final project amount that Council feels is fiscally responsible to Howick residents and that they can support moving ahead with".

Howick Township staff and a member of Council toured a 6200 square foot Wellington County child care facility this week that

was built in 2019 for 64 licensed child care spaces. While the first drawings and cost estimate of Howick's proposed child care centre was measuring 14,000 square feet and an estimated cost of \$5 million, this was simply a starting point, and staff are continuing to work to significantly reducing the footprint and overall cost of the project.

"I want to emphasize that Council's endorsement of the project at our November 18th Council meeting wasn't for moving ahead with a \$5 million-dollar facility," said Gillis. "It was giving permission for the Township to apply for \$2 million dollars of available Start-Up Infrastructure Funds through the Canada Wide Early Learning and Child Care (CWELCC) program and for staff to continue to work with an architect on decreasing the size of the facility. As the drawings are amended accordingly, staff will bring additional information and updated cost estimates to Council and post them publicly via the Township website and social media accounts".

Staff also plan to propose that Council consider multiple methods to fund the project, including applying for additional CWELCC funds in 2026, utilizing some municipal reserve funds, a sponsorship fundraising program and the potential of a low-interest rate loan through Infrastructure Ontario. Howick residents will be able to provide their input through the 2026 Municipal Budget process as more accurate information is available and released.

FIRE CODE UPDATES TAKE PLACE January 1, 2026

Often called the invisible killer, carbon monoxide (CO) is an odorless, colorless gas created when fuels (such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane) burn incompletely. In the home, heating and cooking equipment that burn fuel are potential sources of carbon monoxide. Vehicles or generators running in an attached garage can also produce dangerous levels of carbon monoxide. Due to changes to the Ontario Fire Code that take effect on January 1, 2026, you will now be required

to have working carbon monoxide alarms on every level of the home AND outside all sleeping areas. Previously, CO alarms were only required outside of bedrooms. Landlords and homeowners take note: You MUST install working carbon monoxide alarms on every level and outside sleeping areas if your home has any fuel burning appliances (i.e. anything that uses natural gas or propane), a fireplace/wood burning stove, or an attached garage.
